2020 is here, a fresh decade lled È with opportunities to solve challenges and improve life in Orange County. Supervisor Wagner went right to work since taking office in March 2019 with a record amount of accomplishments for the Third District and Orange County residents. Below is a reection Èof the top 5 achievements of 2019, and a glimpse into what a fantastic year 2020 will be.

5. Public Safety

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Supervisor Wagner sponsored dozens of women's and children's selfdefense classes. He partnered with Care Ambulance to ensure hundreds of people were trained in lifesaving CPR and stop-the-bleed rescue techniques.

Drowning prevention was a major priority during the warm-weather

awareness to prevent a child from slipping silently under the water.

Supervisor Wagner also took fire safety seriously, allocating funding for fireghting È aircraft technology and urging residents to protect themselves in an emergency. He led several Town Halls with local leaders and our Orange County Fire Authority to empower our fire-prone communities with the latest tools and information. 4. Guarding Taxpayers



Because Orange County residents pay too much in taxes, Supervisor Wagner worked with Supervisor Michelle Steel to place a Charter Amendment for Orange County on the March 2020 ballot. This will

The Charter Amendment item passed 5-0 and will go before the voters to decide on the March 3, 2020, presidential primary election ballot. A supermajority on the ballot ensures a proposed tax has widespread support.

Additionally, it puts more stringent requirements on elected ocials before digging into the pocketbooks of taxpayers.

As a Board Director at the Toll Roads, Supervisor Wagner voted against an increase in toll fees, watching out for commuters all across Orange County.

3. Promoting Non-Toxic Parks



Numerous community members had concerns about the potential issue of toxic pesticide use in our county parks. Supervisor Wagner directed the county to study best practices for managing vegetation in our outdoor systems, including the use of non-toxic materials. The need to ensure safe natural areas is especially critical when it comes

2. RESTRICTING SOBER LIVING HOMES



A Team Wagner staff member brought to the Supervisor's attention community concerns over proliferating sober living homes in North Tustin, and Supervisor Wagner acted swiftly to address the issue.

May 31, 2019: Supervisor Wagner coordinated a Town Hall with the Health Care Agency and Sheriff's Department to answer over 100 citizens' questions.

June 25, 2019: At the Board of Supervisors hearing, Supervisor Wagner directed a new ordinance dealing with sober living homes to come to the Planning Commission for a vote. The Board unanimously supported his direction.

August 28, 2019: Planning Commission unanimously passed the ordinance.

It only took four short months (by government standards) for Supervisor Wagner to help create a healthier, safer Orange County.

1. REOPENING IRVINE LAKE











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One of the biggest (positive) news stories in Orange County was Irvine Lake's reopening. Supervisor Wagner put four key entities on the hook to solve a three-year conict Ethat prevented the public from accessing the facility: Irvine Company, Irvine Ranch Water District, Serrano Water District, and the County of Orange. The negotiations he led were proved successful.

On August 17, nearly 2,000 excited anglers poured into Santiago Regional Park for shoreline shing. ÈSupervisor Wagner's initiative was the most read story in <u>Voice of OC</u>, Western Outdoor News, and ranked in <u>Irvine Standard's Top 5 "What a Year!: 2019</u>". It led him to be named <u>OC Register's Top 100 Most Influential People</u> in Orange County.

Nearly 300 hundred active residents came out in support of Orange County Classical Academy (OCCA), a free K-12 charter school couched in a civics-style education. Fifty speakers supported OCCA (the maximum number of speaker cards received by the board), while many others held their speech paper as a backup.

The meeting carried into the next day, concluding at 1:20 AM.

With a 4-3 vote, OCCA will be Orange County's rst K-12 free public charter school using the Hillsdale College curriculum. Plans for the doors to open are set for September 2020, starting from K-5 and adding new grades as the school matures.

If you are looking to nurture your network, there is an amazing nexus between growth and success found at the Tustin Chamber.






