Anaheim Hills, February 18, 2020 READ OP-ED <u>HERE</u>




Our veterans are overdue on the promise of a hometown cemetery. At the Gypsum Canyon site, we have the chance to recreate Arlington National Cemetery, only nestled right here in the Third District.

Supervisor Don Wagner invited Chairwoman Michelle Steel to join him for a press event, giving a lay of the land to our honored veterans, the media — and by extension — the public. Tours were provided to illustrate the land's potential use.

The Board of Supervisors transferred 283 acres of land to the Orange County Cemetery District in 2018 to dodge political disputes and build a veterans' cemetery immediately. And Supervisor Wagner is working with a sense of urgency to serve our nation's living generation of veterans and allied veterans, including heroes from the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

We have a suitable site in Anaheim Hills. We now urge the State to do the right thing: Recognize it. Study it. Fund it. Build it.

No Party Preference Voters March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary Election

The Secretary of State's Office has advised the Registrar of Voters that three qualified parties are allowing voters not affiliated with a political party (No Party Preference voters) to vote for their parties' candidates in the 2020 Presidential Primary Election. The parties allowing non-affiliated voters to do so are the Democratic Party, American Independent Party, and the Libertarian Party.

Q: As a No Party Preference Voter, why did I receive a postcard?

A: Since you are registered as No Party Preference, you received a postcard explaining that you have the option to vote for candidates of qualified parties if they notified the Secretary of State that they are allowing non-affiliated voters to do so. You can request a vote-by-mail ballot from the Democratic Party, American Independent Party or the Libertarian party by returning the postcard, or online at ocvote.com/npp. You can also call our office to make this request at 714-567-7600.

Q: Why are only three parties listed on the postcard and not all the other qualified parties, including the Republican, Green, and Peace and Freedom Parties?

A: Only the Democratic, American Independent, and Libertarian Parties notified the Secretary of State that they are allowing non-affiliated (No Party Preference) voters to vote for candidates of their parties.

Q: Why didn't the other parties allow No Party Preference voters to vote for their candidates?

A: This was a decision made by each political party, not the Registrar of Voters. Contact the political parties for more information.

Q: If I am a No Party Preference voter, how can I request a ballot for the Republican Party, Green Party, or Peace and Freedom Party?

A: You need to re-register with that party. You can fill out a paper registration form or register online at ocvote.com/register.


The Orange County Board of Supervisors is seeking applications from quali ed candidates to serve on the First 5 Orange County Children and Families Commission.

5.


Observed role models of cooperative, respectful and effective communication and behavior ALREADY in effect.
