Special Request to the Board from HCA

COVID-19 presents challenges to the Health Care Agency (HCA) Behavioral Health Services (BHS). To overcome these challenges, they are offering services by telephone (voice only) or telehealth (video and voice). Beneficiaries or clients can receive in-home remotely, as providers may deliver services regardless of location; care is on par with in-person visits.

HCA has expanded its on-line and telephonic resources for first-responders and other community members riddled with stress and fear. The HCA website offers extra support online at OC Links and the NAMI Warm Line.

Our global economy has been gut-punched; behavioral Health has doubled over. Funding sources are often based on tax revenues and are anticipated to be lower for the next two fiscal years.

While HCA looks for additional grants or funding opportunities, now is the time to leverage the funds to begin a Credentialed Peer Specialists Program.

Peer support services are support staff who check-in daily with people to share their personal experiences of behavioral health (Medi-Cal in California) for 50% of the cost of services provided by certified peers.

California is lagging in peer certification despite its proven benefits to both peers and clients. Studies show reductions in hospitalizations, less depression, and enhanced self-advocacy.

A statewide peer specialist certification program offers a standardized career path to qualified people seeking formal training. BHS Peers are key to a solid behavioral health program, effective in supporting recovery for mental health and substance abuse.

FEMA indicated it will not reimburse for COVID-19 mental health services. HCA welcomes additional reimbursement opportunities for mental health services.



"Our role should be to empower Dr. Quick, in her professional capacity, to give the leading-edge medical recommendations to flatten the curve," said Supervisor Wagner.

The Board followed Supervisor Wagner's recommendation, demonstrating its ability to limit its powers on issues outside its purview, deferring to medical experts who are constantly updating their knowledge of this virus.



WHERE: Signs can be preordered at communityfoundationoforange.o and orangehomegrown.org and are available for pick-up or front door delivery.


